GRH'S REGIONAL CANCER CENTRE: A PROVINCIAL LEADER. BUILT ON A HISTORY OF EXCEPTIONAL CARE







GRH FACT

With roots in a history of exceptional care, Grand River Hospital's Regional Cancer Centre has built on a tradition of excellence in its first 10 years.

And since 2009, Cancer Care Ontario has recognized GRH's cancer centre as the top, or within the top three highest rated cancer programs in the province.

The hospital's cancer centre stands on the site that housed the original Berlin and Waterloo Hospital that opened in the mid-1890s. This original building (later re-named the Scott Pavilion) was replaced by the bright, welcoming cancer centre building. However the guiding principles remain: to improve the health of our community with the best information, equipment and staff while fostering the education of new health professionals.

"Before the cancer centre, our small cancer clinic provided very specific treatments and blood transfusions but only a limited range of services," explains Donna Van Allen, systemic therapy program director. "We didn't have the capacity or staff to provide the services we have today."

Since opening in 2003, the hospital's cancer centre has become a provincial leader in cancer care by being the first cancer centre in Ontario:

- With a paperless radiation department providing accurate health information quickly;
- To be fully integrated with a hospital, saving operating costs and providing patients with streamlined care across cancer and hospital programs; and
- With diagnostic assessment services that include nurse navigators who help to diagnose cancer faster for better outcomes. The program currently has specialized clinics to diagnose lung, breast, colorectal and prostate cancers.

From the \$12,000 original hospital building to the current \$56.7 million 9,000 square metre centre, GRH's Regional Cancer Centre has grown to meet the needs of Waterloo and Wellington patients.

"It's very fitting to me that the cancer centre is associated with a history of exceptional care," says Van Allen. "We've come a long way in 10 years but I think the biggest benefit is that people from our communities are able to access quality cancer care, close to their homes."

Samantha went to her school's clinic where they took blood and sent her home to rest. She awoke to many missed calls from the clinic urging her to go immediately to Guelph General Hospital. With her mom by her side, the doctor told Samantha she might have cancer and would be transferred to GRH's Regional Cancer Centre.

"It was a terrifying moment that I'll never forget," explains Samantha. "But after arriving at GRH I was greeted and cared for by nurses who were unbelievably nice and met my doctor almost immediately."

A few days after arriving at GRH, Samantha was diagnosed with acute myeloid leukemia. She started treatment right away and spent the next month in a hospital bed.

"After a month in the hospital, I had the option of transferring to a larger facility in Toronto since it was closer to my Brampton home. But right from the beginning, my family and I felt so comfortable with the caring and thoughtful nurses. We knew we wanted to stay at GRH."

Samantha is now in remission but she will always remember the people who helped her through her journey.

"It takes a certain type of person to be a nurse and work with cancer patients," explains Samantha. "I genuinely consider all my nurses and care providers at Grand River Hospital to be my friends and family."

GRH works closely with Cancer Care Ontario and area hospitals to ensure Waterloo Wellington GRH residents have the best access to specialized cancer care.

"I was a first year University of Guelph student playing for the lacrosse team when I just didn't feel myself," recalls Samantha. "I felt very tired, out of shape, and I thought my

Olav den Ouden couldn't agree more. After starting his ninth year of volunteering at the cancer centre, he looks forward to being able to help even in the smallest ways.

"Every Monday, I see complete strangers and sometimes friends. Every Monday, I go home and tell my wife that I made a few folks smile this morning. It's heartwarming to help," says den Ouden.

The team at the cancer centre has many layers. It's the work they do together that creates a remarkable environment.

"The stress of a cancer diagnosis and treatment is an immense burden," explains Anne Schmidt, resource nurse for chemotherapy. "I feel privileged to be part of the cancer centre team and to travel this journey with our patients."

GRH: MAKING A DIFFERENCE IN CANCER CARE THROUGH SPECIALIZED DIAGNOSTICS AND TREATMENT

Surgical, laboratory **GRH FA** and medical imaging services have seen major enhancements since GRH's Regional Cancer Centre opened in 2003.

Waterloo and Wellington patients have benefited from 10 years of specialized care at GRH's Regional Cancer Centre. However, that exceptional care goes beyond the cancer centre building.

Cancer treatment depends on sophisticated laboratory testing, medical imaging and surgery. These programs have moved forward in leaps and bounds at GRH since the cancer centre opened in 2003.

Half of GRH's laboratory studies involve identifying potentially-cancerous tissues. The lab at GRH's KW Site conducts testing on tissues for patients from both Grand River and St. Mary's hospitals.

The lab has cut wait times for reporting from these tests. Thanks to new LEAN processes, nearly 90 per cent of biopsy cases are completed in five days. Quicker turnaround means faster answers for patients awaiting the results.

GRH's medical imaging service provides more than 125,000 studies a year. Several upgrades to the hospital's MRI unit have boosted its imaging capabilities, improving care for patients who may be at a higher risk of illnesses such as breast cancer.

Patients have also benefited from an upgraded interventional radiology unit installed in 2012. It combines x-rays and ultrasounds with minimally-invasive surgery to treat a variety of conditions, including cancer.

The hospital plays a key role in surgeries coordinated through cancer programs, such as bowel and breast surgery.

GRH is also a centre of excellence for liver and pancreatic surgery. New procedures launched at the hospital have allowed for liver cancer surgery with very small incisions, providing faster recoveries and fewer complications for patients.

Thanks to teamwork and innovation throughout GRH, patients benefit from the best specialized cancer care close to home.

In a survey from July to September 2012, patients gave the GRH Regional Cancer Centre's outpatient chemotherapy service a 99 percent satisfaction ratios
